A MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR





ORLANDO'S BEFORE & AFTER

Excerpt from sermon preached on June 19, 2016 by the Rev. Mariah Furness Tollgaard based on the Old Testament story of Cain & Abel.

Carrie Newcomer has a beautiful song called, "Before and After." She writes,

"There are experiences by which we mark our lives. Some of these experiences are large events — the birth of a child, the loss of a parent, a wedding or divorce. Some of these experiences are small moments that we did not realize at the time would effect us so profoundly. There is always another - a before and after and because of that, our lives grow deeper."

Cain's life was never the same after he killed Abel. There was before and there was after, when his brother's blood cried out to him from the ground. We are all descendants of Cain.

Our country had a before and after moment this week in the tragic shooting at an Orlando Night club. Our hearts have been aching in response to the deadly massacre. Another mass shooting - yet this time the deadliest on US soil and an act of hatred against the LGBTQ community.

Again, we find ourselves asking how did we get into this situation- again? And as with the writers of Cain and Abel - the stories start spinning as we grapple to make sense of the senseless. Accusations are flying and

commentators and politicians seem quick to pit the most vulnerable of our society against one another. Their vitriol is palpable.

In response we want to say - "We are all Orlando." But we are not all Orlando. We are all Omar Mateen.

We are all descendants of Cain.

We continue to build systems of oppression and subjection in order to perpetuate our own way of life. To protect ourselves from the unknown and the other.

We deny our interdependence in exchange for a false dependence on guns.

We reject God's abundance and fall into the trap of scarcity.

We hide behind the internet and social media to put forth hate speech or to put forth condemn those who disagree with us.

We sacrifice our brothers and sisters so that we might keep our comforts, our sense of security, so that we don't have to change.

For those in the Pulse Nightclub last Saturday night and their loved ones we can not even begin to imagine their before and afters – as they try to put their lives together again.



CONTINUING EDUCATION & SPIRITUAL RENEWAL LEAVE FOR PASTOR MARIAH

A now famous picture on social media are the blood soaked tennis shoes of a doctor in the Orlando Emergency Room who treated many of the victims - Dr Joshua Corsa wrote - On these shoes, soaked between its fibers,

is the blood of 54 innocent human beings. I don't know which were straight, which were gay, which were black, or which were Hispanic. What I do know is that they came to us in wave upon wave of suffering, screaming, and death..."This blood, which poured out of those patients and soaked through my scrubs and shoes, will stain me forever.

So it is with us the descendants of Cain.

Our brother's and sister's blood cries out to us from the soil beneath our feet.

This moment is a before and after for all of us. It must be.

We are called to be our brother and sister's keeper and to love our neighbor as ourselves. If that is not Christianity - then I don't know what is.

Earlier the year, Hamline Church asked how we can be a better neighbor. A Muslim woman and a transgender man stood before us in this pulpit and said almost the same thing:

"See us. Know our story. Help us to be safe and include us in the community—as we seek to create a better world with you."

So at the same time we grieve this horrific act of violence against the LGBTQ community and pledge our allegiance as a reconciling church, we also stand behind our blessed Ramadan signs and our commitment to interfaith work and educating against Islamophobia in our community.

To all our neighbors – to our brothers and sisters, to our children, to one another we say – we see you. Nothing can separate you from the fact that you are created good in the eyes of God: not the rejection of your family or faith community, not the words or slurs of strangers, not policies policing your body, not your own self-loathing that this world does not yet see you as whole, not a gunman at a club, not the color of your skin, not your immigration status, not your religion, not whether you are out or closeted. God loves you. We love you. Nothing can take that love away from you.

As the living of our days is defined by the before and afters - may we live in pursuit of God's mercy and grace and may the marks on our brow attest to our care for our brothers and sisters - until God's kingdom comes on earth as it is in heaven.

While several folks have been involved with the family, we'd like to offer more of our congregation the opportunity to get to know Maung Bi and Klu Paw and the kids by accompanying them on some of their visits and sharing a fun day out with the family. CHURCH PIANO

In May, Hamline Church became the proud owner of "new" piano. Following a two-month fundraising campaign which raised over \$20,000, a purchasing team of Jan Kimes (member), Matthew Mehaffey (Director of Music) and Kim Kasling (organist) settled on a beautiful 6 foot grand piano. It is a used instrument built in the 1990's and is made by Yamaha, one of the leading makers of pianos in the world. It is now in its new home on the floor of the sanctuary where it has been outfitted with an on-board humidification system, a thermal cover, a new dolly for easy moving, and a lock. All of these accessories will ensure that the piano is in great playing shape for generations to come. The piano also received a complete tune up from our piano technician. The purchasing team chose this instrument for its beauty (a shiny ebony finish) and its sonority: the piano has a beautiful, rich low register and a very clear and articulate keyboard. It is has already been featured in worship several times and will be used for worship and also to attract musical groups to come to Hamline for their concerts. Donations are still being accepted for there piano; any overage will go into a piano maintenance fund to keep the piano in tip-top shape.

Congratulations to Matt!

Director of Music Matthew Mehaffey was recently named the Music Director of the Mendelssohn Choir of Pittsburgh. Matt will start commuting regularly to work with the choir and the Pittsburgh Symphony in August. His final Sunday at Hamline Church will be August 7. The purpose is to offer guidance and friendship, because I know that its a big step and it can be a lot to take in and try to understand at once. 9th-12th graders would be paired up with 7th graders and they would be able to have 1 on 1 conversations as well as whole group conversations about how everything is going.

This project is something I feel would build a stronger relationship between the youth as well as making the confirmands feel more comfortable.

UMW SCHOLARCHIP RECIPIENT, SYMONE BROWN



TIME FOR A DEEP BREATH!



Conference season is over for another year! This year included a technologically significant quadrennial General Conference (GC) in Portland, Oregon, accompanied by streaming live sessions, blogs, and basic access for anyone with an internet connection. Decisions affecting our Discipline (rule book) are decided at these sessions. Especially relevant to us, our Dakotas-Minnesota Area Bishop Bruce R. Ough was elected president of the United Methodist Council of Bishops, a world-wide role.

The last time GC was held in Minnesota was 1956, doubly significant because it marked the centennial of the birth of the Minnesota Annual Conference (MAC) and the year that full clergy rights for women (with guaranteed appointments) were approved, though women clergy had served congregations in Minnesota for decades. This year's MAC celebrated both those anniversaries, in addition to other business matters relevant to the MAC as body.

Hamline Church and Hamline University have served as the cohosts for MAC. In 1948 the former Northern Annual Conference met at the Church, while the Minnesota Annual Conference met at Hamline University. The celebration honoring their merger was held at the Church. The new Minnesota Annual Conference returned until 1969, the year after the merger of the Evangelical United Brethren Church with the Methodist Church to become The United Methodist Church. Following standard practice, ministers typically met at Hamline Church and the lay delegates at the Field

House. Ordinations, worship services and at least one dinner were held at the Church.

Perhaps the most significant to take place at Hamline Church in 1956, on the heels of that year's GC authorization of full clergy rights for women, was when The Rev. Mary MacNicholl became the first woman in Minnesota to become a trial member of the MAC and eligible to receive full clergy rights. As Rev. Ken Beck later reminisced:

"She was ready, and so when the time came-it was like Lincoln said, 'I will study and prepare myself, and perhaps the day will come.' She had done that. Of course Jeanne Audrey Powers was working at Boston getting her degree-but when the door opened, [Mary] was already there."

The Rev. MacNicholl had already received a seminary degree from Drew University in New Jersey before she had been ordained deacon in 1950 and elder in 1952. She was voted into full membership in the MAC in 1958. In recalling our heritage, we must also remember that today's current events will become tomorrow's heritage. Our MAC will continue to meet each year. The next scheduled GC session will take place in Minneapolis in 2020.

These denominational legislative bodies like the GC (and the MAC) are likely to continue to be in the secular news in the future. In Portland, Bishop Ough established a group to meet on the major issue that faced the GC this year: how our world-wide denomination should deal with the social issue of same-sex marriage and the rights of LGBTQ members. Among other actions, he called for unity and focus on our agreements rather than our points of difference. And Bishop Ough's recent statement after the Orlando shooting is a good reminder, too:

"As the people called United Methodist, let us not lose heart, but redouble our commitment and efforts to fulfill God's vision of the Beloved Community throughout the world."

WELCOME TO MIDWEST CHILD DEVELOPMENT

We are excited to report that we have a new daycare tenant, Midwest Child Development. MCD uses a Headstart Minnesota model, intentionally working with children of low income families to provide essential and quality early childhood education. They begin moving in on July 1st and will be open for business on July 11. Our existing tenant, Bilingual Childcare and Education Center, will be staying on through August, and will be moving into Rooms 6 and 7 (Youth Room & Godly Play Room). For a short while, we will be bursting at the seams with children!

We are also taking advantage of this time to do some repairs and improvements. The most obvious improvement will be changing out the carpet in the daycare rooms for vinyl plank tile and replacing one of the sinks. Other improvements are more behind the scenes. We'll be finishing our and rekeying and alarm system upgrades to include an integrated entry system for the west door for the new daycare as well as a few more cameras to cover all the building exits; a plumbing fix for the downstairs hall bathrooms so our friend the drain cleaner doesn't have to visit us so often; and a new roof over the Sanctuary stairwells so we can get rid of the bucket on the NW stairs. We hope as you come in for services you will also notice the refinished wood doors - they look fantastic! We will be providing a new system as well to hold the doors open. This will prevent the hinges from getting bent and the door then out of alignment. A stuck door is not an open door, and we are all about opening our doors and offering welcome and hospitality to new and old alike.
